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Letter from the ACAT Committee

If it's not too late to say it, "Happy New Year to you all!"

Christmas has now been put away for another year, Candlemas falls in early February and on the tenth of the same month we mark Ash Wednesday. The Church's season is well under way. Before we know it we will be in the midst of Easter celebrations, then the glory of Pentecost.

I love Candlemas, when we remember how Mary and Joseph took the child Jesus to the temple, where he was greeted by Simeon and Anna. It was Simeon who recognised the child for who he was and spoke those words that have come down to us through the centuries, known as the Nunc Dimittis: "Lord, now lettest thou thy servant depart in peace..."

It is important at this time to recognise the need for us all to see each other's humanity. Remember the crucifixion of Jesus, his trial where Pilate paraded Jesus before the crowd who were demanding his execution. Pilate said to the crowd about Jesus, "Behold the man" It is only by failing to recognise the humanity of others, by dehumanising others and themselves that torturers are able to carry out their painful, degrading and humiliating activities.

At the temple where Simeon takes Jesus into his arms to bless him starts the other way round. Here Simeon doesn't just accept the humanity of Jesus, he recognises his divinity. Here wrapped in human flesh is the one who saves, the Messiah, the Son of God. And Simeon blesses the One whom he probably would have preferred to be blessed by; just as John the Baptist is later to baptise the One by whom he would rather have been baptised.

The Candlemas scene in the temple is a reminder that we are to recognise the Christ in ourselves and in others. St Paul tells us in Colossians 1:27 that the great secret of the Christian faith is "Christ in us".

At the time this letter is being written once again we see the horrendously tragic sight of bodies of men, women and children being

pulled out of the sea in the Greek Islands and Turkey. Bodies of those who are struggling to escape from the inhumanity in Syria and other areas in the hope that they can restart their lives in the safety and security of Europe. The Greek Islands, places of tranquillity and restfulness to the many holiday makers drawn there, once again the site of great tragedy.

How can we prevent this evil?

Last year, we ran an appeal in support of the Syrian and Iranian refugees who were spending a winter in cold refugee camps, with little to eat or drink, no warmth and no hope. We obtained many many signatures which were sent to the Home Office, with covering letters going to those people in authority in the UK. We were unsure if this would work; would it be read even? Especially as we received just a very short acknowledgment from the Home Office.

There are a great many appeals to be written over the coming year, we cannot see the situation in Syria righted immediately but at some point there will be an end in sight. The task is not over.

We pray that God will give us all the strength we need for the tasks that lie ahead this year, and especially for all that we will try to do on behalf of others who are being tortured even now, as you read this.

Especially as we once again appeal to the membership to prayerfully consider if they wish to join our small and ever dwindling committee.

As we seek to put Kingdom values into practice may we recognise the Christ within us all and know that in serving others in his name, we are serving him.

Remember in your Prayers

Mohammad Faisal Abu Sakha, Israel On 14 December 2015, Mohammad set out from his parents' home to the Palestinian Circus School where he works. But he never made it. Israeli soldiers stopped him at a checkpoint and took him to a nearby detention centre. He has been held ever since, and is now thought to be in Megiddo Prison, in northern Israel. He has never been charged with a crime and his family have not been allowed to visit him.

23 members of the Lesotho army at risk of unfair trial and possible death penalty facing a court martial on mutiny charges. 19 soldiers are still in detention; they have been in custody at Maseru Maximum Security Prison since May and were in solitary confinement for almost two months, up to the end of preliminary proceedings on 4 December. There are concerns that evidence against them was obtained through torture and that they will not receive a fair trial.

Erick Ivan and Veronica Razo Casales, Mexico, brother and sister, in preventive detention for four and a half years. Under torture, they were forced to confess to kidnapping. Although their torture is proven, they are still being held in prison. The only evidence against them are the statements made by their co-defendants, presumably under torture.

Natalya Sharina, Russia Director of the Library of Ukrainian Literature in Moscow. Police raided her home, after a tip-off from an ex-employee who was dismissed in 2010. After searching her home for hours, the police went to the library to continue their hunt for 'extremist literature'. Investigators claimed to find works by Dmitry Korchinsky - a Ukrainian nationalist - in a pile of books that had not been indexed or made available to the public.

Nabeel Rajab, Bahrain Director of the Bahrain Centre for Human Rights. He has been detained since 2 April 2014, accused of insulting the body corporate, spreading false rumours in time of war and sending tweets denouncing violations of human rights.

GOOD FRIDAY AND EASTER

From "At the Cross" by Richard Bauckham and Trevor Hart - a meditation on the role of Simon of Cyrene

Following Jesus' way to the cross must involve for us the bringing to remembrance of those with whom Jesus suffered, the victims with whom he identified, especially those who are so easily forgotten, and locked away in the prisons of the world, hidden by political propaganda, neglected in the dark places of our world.... There are many kinds of forgotten and neglected suffering. To remember the victims we must take the way of the cross, with Jesus, beyond illusions into the brutal reality of this world. This is a costly and difficult task, but like Simon of Cyrene we shall find it draws us closer to Jesus. Lord, break the chains of humiliation and death, just as on that glorious morning when you were raised. Let those who weep as they sow the seeds of justice and freedom, gather the harvest of peace and reconciliation. Those who weep as they go out as instruments of your love will come back singing with joy, as they witness to the disappearance of hate and the manifestation of your love in the world.

Replies to Appeals

Thank you to all members who have sent in their replies to an Appeal to the authorities in North Korea.

All replies were of course in Korean but we have managed to obtain a translation:

As a nation of established liberal democracy and democratic judicial order, the Republic of Korea is a place where basic rights, such as the right to assemble, and also human rights are better guaranteed than in any other country. Lae Goon Park, Hyung Sik Kim, Hyung Jae Ham whom you are claiming to be human rights activists did not organise peaceful assemblies but rather led widespread illegal violent protests on 4 occasions in around April - May 2015 (committed illegal acts of riot standards by assaulting police officer which resulted in dozens of people getting injured, by destroying 70 buses of the police department, and by stealing the contents from police department buses, which were for public use). Clearly in violation of the positive laws of the Republic of Korea. As such, these people were arrested on charges and detained according to the criminal justice procedure of the Republic of Korea and are currently on trial in Court of Law.

When the trial tests are confirmed, it is to be decided whether or not these people will be released (as of November 2, 2015, Lae Goon Park was released on bail and stands trial for the first trial while not being held in detention, and Hyung Sik Kim and Hyung Jae Ham received suspended sentences, while receiving guilty verdicts on all counts, and have since been released.)

It seems to us that this is a positive result in some ways.

Thanks must go to Rosemary McCosh for arranging the translation and taking the trouble to send it in. Other members sent in translations in part, but this was the most complete one we received.

Feedback from the 2015 Christmas Greetings Card Campaign

This was, once again, a success. The names were included in our last mailing, placed on our web site and sent to hundreds of people via our email connections. In addition, the list was made available through the Justice and Peace Network, and many dioceses. One diocese in fact included a copy in literature sent over the internet to its parishioners, meaning potentially 5000 copies were received. Probably this year the list reached more people than ever before

Horfield Parish Church in Bristol had a signing session on the first 2 Sundays in Advent. A total of 85 cards were sent. People were encouraged to take the slip containing the information home with them and put it on their fridge door as a reminder to pray for the person during Advent and Christmas

Another church sent 34 cards.

St Joseph the Worker, Hutton sent a total of 120 cards to prisoners.

The Justice and Peace group in Coventry organises a signing every year using our list. When they first did it they left the addressing of envelopes to the parishioners and found the short addresses were the most popular! So now, all addresses are handwritten on the envelopes in advance, making sure each prisoner/group gets at least one card. They also cut the list up so that the information for each entry is put in an envelope for the parishioners to read. Some take the slip home to remember them in their prayers. They make sure that no information is left in the envelope before sealing it. Donations cover the cost of mailing the cards, with any excess sent to us.

These are only a few of the feedback reports sent to us. Thank you all so much for making the card signing such a success yet again.

Last year we produced an Easter Greetings card for Christian prisoners and made it available to members who receive the newsletter by email. It proved to be very successful so we are doing this once again but this time for all our members.

This should be available during Lent and will be sent to members who request it.

Urgent

We are sad to advise that at the AGM this year we will be needing a Chairman, a Secretary and a Treasurer along with several committee members. After having been on the committee as Treasurer for nearly 10 years Ray Dunnett feels that he needs to give up to relieve his workload somewhat. Margaret Russell, having stood down at the last AGM as Chairman but continuing as Secretary, advised that she would be retiring from the committee in 2016 after 20 years' service.

Clearly, losing several major members of the committee - Secretary, Treasurer, Membership Secretary and Minutes Secretary and still not being able to recruit a Chairman - we have had to really review the situation.

As you may remember we sent a letter to all members last year stating the manpower problems ACAT UK was experiencing; we did manage to recruit 2 committee members at that time who may be able to take on the positions of Secretary and Minutes Secretary.

However even so, at a committee meeting recently it was decided that the matter was now extremely serious. As such we agreed that unless we manage to recruit people willing to join the committee by the time of the AGM in October we could have no option but to look at closing the charity.

The Recent Executions in Saudi Arabia

In early December the ACAT-UK Death Penalty Campaign group sent appeals to the British Foreign Secretary, Philip Hammond, urging him to investigate reports that Saudi Arabia was soon to execute 52 prisoners in a single day and asking him to use Britain's influence to stop this grotesque procedure if the reports were true. Some of the condemned were juveniles who were arrested at protest meetings. It seems that they may well have been tortured into making confessions. According to Arabic media reports all the prisoners were convicted in the secretive Specialised Criminal Court. Many of them were outspoken critics of the government.

Sadly in January we heard that 47 of the prisoners were executed (some beheaded) but at least the juveniles were not. These include Ali al-Nimr, the nephew of the Shia cleric Nimr al-Nimr (the outspoken Shia critic of the government whose execution outraged Iran and fellow Shias internationally).

Ali al-Nimr and Dawoud al-Marhoon were both 17 when they were arrested and possibly tortured into making 'confessions' in the wake of political protests in Saudi Arabia's eastern province. Both faced execution by beheading and Ali by having his body crucified afterwards. However probably because of an international outcry this sentence was not carried out.

Saudi Arabia executed 158 people in 2015 - the highest number for Saudi Arabia in two decades according to Human Rights Watch (*The Times* 2 Jan 2016). The previous year the number was 90.

The media have claimed that the UK (with its huge trade in arms) has not pressured Saudi Arabia to stop its executions.

This has been stoutly denied by the Parliamentary Under-Secretary of State for Foreign and Commonwealth Affairs, Mr Tobias Ellwood.

In a speech to the House of Commons (Hansard 5 Jan 2016) he said:

'As I said in my statement on Sunday, the UK is firmly opposed to the death penalty. Our opposition extends to all circumstances and all countries. We remain firmly committed to advancing the global abolition of the death penalty. Regarding recent articles on the FCO's

"Strategy for Abolition of the Death Penalty 2010-2015", I would like to clarify that this document is a general policy guide from 2011, rather than a case-by-case list of countries where the death penalty is applied. A full list of countries of concern was published in March 2015 in the annual human rights report; that includes Saudi Arabia and its use of the death penalty. The Saudi Arabian Government are well aware of our views. We will continue to raise our concerns with them.

We also raised the case of Ali al-Nimr with the Saudi authorities again over the weekend. We expect that Ali al-Nimr and the two others who were convicted as juveniles will not be executed. We will continue to raise these cases with the Saudi authorities.

More broadly, Saudi Arabia remains a Foreign and Commonwealth Office human rights priority country, not only because of the use of the death penalty, but because of restricted access to justice, women's rights, and restrictions on freedom of expression, freedom of assembly and freedom of religion or belief. The UK's position on human rights in Saudi Arabia is a matter of public record.'


While this is reassuring, the fact that Saudi Arabia is one of Britain's major customers for its weapons is a matter of concern. This also means that the UK has influence with the Saudi government. ACAT-UK will therefore continue to pressure the British Foreign Office to use this influence whenever relevant.

Bishop Trevor Huddleston, campaigned against the evils of apartheid and wrote "Naught for your Comfort" once said: I have found Jesus where every Christian should expect to find him; in the darkness, in the fear, in the blinding weariness of Calvary. And Calvary is but one step from the Empty Tomb. We cannot take the full measure of the world's sorrows but Christ has died, Christ has risen and Christ will triumph; the world's evil will be swallowed up by the goodness of our God; the clamour of war will be silenced by the peace of our God; the despair of humanity in all its need will be overruled by the hope which Christ inspires.

There is no dichotomy between man and God's image. Whoever tortures a human being, whoever abuses a human being, whoever outrages a human being, abuses God's image. *Archbishop Oscar Romero*
